


Christmas delights at COSMO Restaurant

The Special School has been celebrating pupils and their love of reading with a prize-giving ceremony.

Young people were commended for their efforts as the awards scheme returned following a three-year absence due to COVID.

Parents, carers, staff and governors came together to celebrate the achievements of pupils, who were handed awards in five categories; consistent improvement in reading over three years, most improved, consistent improvement in reading, hardest effort in reading and excellent start to reading for Year 7 pupils.
