Tyler, who is a Derby County season ticket holder, said: "I knew my teacher used to play professional football, but I couldn't believe he spoke to Paul about me – it's absolutely sick.

"I was speechless when he showed me the video, I just couldn't believe it. I love that Paul is wearing his woolly hat too – I can't wait to show it to my mates. I go to all the home matches and it's been great to see The Rams winning.

"I've got it on my phone and I've shown it to my family who were really impressed. I do love it here - it's so much better than my previous school and the staff are kinder and really help me when I'm struggling. One of the things I'd like to do when I leave school is to be a football coach, so to get one of the best sending me a video is great."

Vicki Cutting, personalised programme coordinator, said: "We have a weekly meeting where staff decide who has gone above and beyond each week and Tyler's name is always put forward because he has such a good attitude. He is conscientious and hardworking, trustworthy and reliable and always here on time, in fact he's usually here before staff.

It was a great opportunity to learn about shelters, be a valuable member of a team and get their hands dirty!




Building a better future at construction facility
